

## ARGENTINA

“Whether relishing in the abundance of birds in the *yungas* forests of Calilegua National Park, searching for flamingos on high Andean lakes on the altiplano, having a backdrop of scarlet firebush for perched birds in Patagonia or seeing the snow-capped peaks of the Andes surrounding the Beagle Channel, birding in Argentina is always an incredible odyssey enhanced this year by unprecedented weather throughout the tour. The record highs and dry weather in Buenos Aires, while first disappointing with no water in Costanera Sur, turned out to be a bonus as we explored other reserves close to the city with unexpected bird sightings. And although we wondered about the effect of hot weather on the Magellanic Penguins at the colony in Punta Tambo, we enjoyed our morning there without having to struggle with the winds that normally make it nearly impossible to hold optics steady while viewing Chubut Steamerducks and other species on the water. The Moreno Glacier is stunning on any day, but more so on a sunny day without wind. And while a trip down the Beagle Channel with sun and no wind on our outward journey had us wondering about potential seabird sightings, the legendary winds picked up during our journey for enjoyment of albatrosses gliding against the backdrop of the Andes and Magellanic Diving Petrels flying close to the water before disappearing, thus providing us with the seabird experience we had longed for. The saying goes ‘if you want to see Patagonia, stand still and it will blow past you.’ Thus was our experience in Rio Grande as we paid the price of the incredible weather during the rest of our trip while seeking Ruddy-headed Geese and Rufous-chested Dotterels. The contrasts of Argentina represented by diverse bird families ranging from tropical to sub-Antarctic including toucans, antshrikes, flamingoes, seedsnipes, rheas, penguins, plantcutters, tinamous, albatrosses, diving-petrels and multiple others against spectacular scenic backdrops once again made this year’s tour a sensational birding experience.

Our Andes week started in the *yungas* forest and transitional scrub habitat around Salta and in Calilegua National Park. Upon arrival in Salta, we soon found ourselves developing a fondness for empanadas as we discovered you can munch while enjoying new birds such as White Monjitas and Whistling Herons. Most of us made sleep a low priority to take advantage of a night-birding option our first night where we watched Hoy’s and Tropical Screech Owls calling a short distance from each other, listened to the haunting call of Common Potoo before sighting it on its perch and had flight views of a female Scissor-tailed Nightjar. An early morning sighting of a Red-legged Seriema, a new family for many in the group, portended an excellent day’s birding toward our destination of San Martin, our base for our visits to Calilegua National Park. Calilegua is one of northwestern Argentina’s superb birding sites – a little used road that passes through the *yungas* forest at different altitudes. The flights of groups of Alder Parrots and Mitred Parakeets, a brief sighting of a White-throated Antpitta, stunning encounters with Giant Antshrike, the unexpected Blue-crowned Motmot (thanks to the tip from the park ranger on its location), Toco Toucans, Dusky-legged Guans and mixed species flocks kept us alert and intent upon maximizing every minute of our time in the park. Regretfully leaving this superb birding area, we retraced our steps before veering north toward the Yala Valley where within mere minutes both our targets, Torrent Ducks and Rufous-throated Dippers were sighted. As darkness descended upon the valley, patience prevailed when Lyre-tailed Nightjars left their forest roosts and gave us flight views.

As we started ascending toward the altiplano, each stop was filled with new birds and spectacular scenery including White-tipped Plantcutters, Giant Hummingbirds and Red-tailed Comets. Abra Pampa gave us an opportunity to see a side of high Andean life that few tourists ever see and to explore areas around the village and the road that leads to Pozuelos National Monument. Winter rains had left water in unlikely spots thus affording us the opportunities to study all 3 species of flamingoes at close range. Everything Puna from ibises to hawks to plovers were within our sights during our day on the altiplano. As with all birding trips, all too soon, our time in the high Andes was over and we retraced our route to where we had begun, Salta for our return flight to Buenos Aires.

After saying good-bye to a couple of our companions and welcoming others into our group, we turned our sights southward. The pampas, northern Patagonia, southern Patagonia, Tierra del Fuego – the areas south of Buenos Aires are often dreamlands for birders – some of those must-bird places on earth. Southern Screamers, Greater Rheas, Many-colored Rush-tyrants – each new sighting seemed to surpass the previous one showing how fickle we birders can be. The sheer immensity of the pampas and the abundance of wildlife were incredible, especially considering that we were just on the fringes of this habitat and only 4 hours from Buenos Aires. Buenos Aires, a mega city in population, proved to contain treasure reserves for wildlife as we visited the Costanera Sur that although devoid of waterfowl still offered abundant birdlife, Reserva Ecologica Vicente Lopez with Red-rumped Warbling Finches and a very obliging Rufous-side Crane, and Ribera Norte Reserve.

## ARGENTINA: Bird List...2

A new set of avifauna greeted us in northern Patagonia – Magellanic Penguins brayed, waddled and tended young or eggs in the colony in Punta Tambo, Chubut Steamerducks fed our urge to see endemics and Elegant Crested Tinamous convinced some that tinamous are not a fictitious family. Southern Right Whales up-close and personal will remain a highlight of the Valdez Peninsula with the strange Mara running a close second. The thousands of waterfowl on the sewage ponds in stunning afternoon light etched an indelible imprint of northern Patagonia diversity on this flat and remote land.

The steppe of southern Patagonia surrounded by glacial lakes and snow-capped mountains provided a sensational contrast to the flat lands we had experienced in northern Patagonia. The engaging Magellanic Plover was a favourite our first afternoon. Andean Condors, magnificent both when flying and perched, gave superb views as we drove toward the Moreno Glacier. The Magellanic Woodpecker that had all of us abandoning our lunch boxes filled many flash cards as digital cameras were put into overtime. Rufous-tailed Plantcutters perched against the brilliance of scarlet firebush, Spectacled Ducks in a hidden pool and energetic Thorn-tailed Rayaditos held our attention before we were distracted by the picturesque beauty of the Perito Moreno Glacier where for a while birding was forgotten as we watched ice chunks calve and crash into the water and listened to the groans of the ice.

And, on to Tierra del Fuego with southern beech forests, mountains surrounding the southernmost city of the world, Ushuaia, and the Beagle Channel. Four Magellanic Woodpeckers had us scratching our heads at their strange interaction and a cooperative Magellanic Tapaculo highlighted our day in Tierra del Fuego National Park. Black-browed Albatrosses, Gentoo Penguins, Magellanic Diving-Petrels were among the species that reinforced how close to the Antarctic our travels had taken us. A brief visit to Rio Grande allowed us to sight a few more target species as well as sample the legendary winds before heading back to Buenos Aires. Our final day spent at Otamendi Reserve gave us views of Curve-billed Reedhaunter and Giant Wood-Rail as well as more encounters with some of the previously seen pampas birds before we said our good-byes at the airport later that evening.

A diverse country from birds, mammals, and geography, a congenial and enthusiastic group of birders, excellent infrastructure, flights that all ran more or less on time and near-perfect weather throughout made this year's tour one of our best ever." Judy Davis.
